Step 1 FIND THE EMAIL

Find the email from the FPU IT Help Desk that included your FPU username and a link to set up your password.

Get your username, password, computer (laptop or desktop, not on mobile) and log on to CampusWeb at campusweb.franklinpierce.edu.

1. Personal Information Update
2. Financial Responsibility Agreement
